THE BURAKU PEOPLE

Japan introduced a caste system in the 17th century. At the bottom were the Senmin people who were referred to as 'eta' (extreme filth) and 'hinin' (non-human). Their descendants are known as the Burakumin.

They often face discrimination and there has been pressure placed on the government to take more action. According to the Buraku Liberation League, approximately 30 per cent of Buraku women have suffered sexual violence.

Estimated population sizes of those suffering from casteism often vary and the Buraku people are not exempt from this. Official government numbers claim there are 1.2 million Buraku people, but unofficial estimates suggest three to six million people.
